Twelve Tips on Keeping Your Holiday Season Sober and Joyous

Holiday parties without liquid spirits may still seem a dreary prospect to new A.A.s. But many of us have enjoyed the happiest holidays of our lives sober—an idea we would never have dreamed of, wanted, or believed possible when drinking. Here are some tips for having an all-round ball without a drop of alcohol.



1 Line up extra A.A. activities for the holiday season. Arrange to take newcomers to meetings, answer the phones at a clubhouse or central office, speak, help with dishes, or visit the alcoholic ward at a hospital.



2 Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



3 Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



4 Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebra-

tions given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



5 Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



6 If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



7 Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



8 Worship in your own way.



9 Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



10 Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember—"one day at a time."



11 Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.

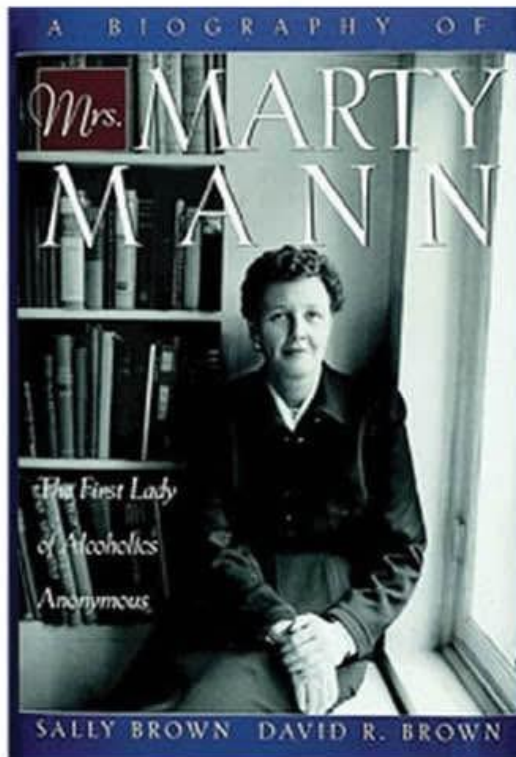

This is a story of one woman's indefatigable effort and indomitable spirit, compellingly told by Sally and David Brown.

Born in Chicago in 1905, Marty was favored with beauty, brains, charisma, phenomenal energy, and a powerful will. She could also out drink anyone in her group of social elites. When her father became penniless, she was forced into work, landed a lucrative public relations position, and a decade later was destitute because of her drinking. She was committed to a psychiatric center in 1938—a time when the term alcoholism was virtually unknown, the only known treatment was “drying out,” and two men were compiling the book Alcoholics Anonymous. Marty read it on the recommendation of psychiatrist Dr. Harry Tiebout: it was her first step toward sobriety and a long, illustrious career as founder of the National Council on Alcoholism, or NCA. In the early 1950s, journalist Edward R. Murrow selected Marty as one of the 10 greatest living Americans. Marty died of a stroke in 1980, shortly after addressing the AA international convention in New Orleans.

Since 2019 H&I's IVSS committee has been implementing a sponsorship service in state prisons in Northern CA. *This is a vital and life-saving effort to carry the message of AA to our incarcerated / members.* This year we introduced a new evolution of our service which utilizes the electronic tools of phone calls, text messaging and video calling which are now provided to prisoners throughout most of CA. These tools also allow H&I volunteers to sponsor anonymously at any NorCal prison from the convenience and security of their own homes without requiring in-person visits, although that option is available as well. WANT TO SPONSOR AN AA MEMBER IN PRISON?

IT'S EASIER THAN YOU THINK!  YOUR ANONYMITY IS PROTECTED!

There's a vital need for AA members from the outside to sponsor AA members in prisons. In order to understand this need, all you need to ask yourself is:

Could I have gotten sober without the help of a sponsor?
If your answer is 'maybe not', then you understand the vital need.

Inside members frequently tell our volunteers they're not comfortable sharing their deepest secrets with other alcoholics in prison due to the chance that the information may not remain confidential. The consequences of the wrong information being revealed on the inside can be catastrophic. This is why H&I pioneered our groundbreaking Inside Visiting Sponsorship Service (IVSS).

ANONYMOUSLY SPONSOR AN AA MEMBER IN PRISON FROM THE SECURITY & CONVENIENCE OF YOUR HOME
(Due to prison regulations, meeting volunteers are ineligible to participate at the facility where they volunteer)

The requirements for IVSS volunteers are:

- 1) Minimum five years' sobriety
- 2) Solid sponsorship experience
- 3) Knowledge & practice of AA's Steps & Traditions
- 4) Willingness to anonymously text, receive phone calls and exchange letters.

Los miembros internos frecuentemente les dicen a nuestros voluntarios que no se sienten cómodos compartiendo sus secretos más profundos con otros alcohólicos en prisión debido a la posibilidad de que la información no permanezca confidencial. Las consecuencias de que se revele información sensible en el interior pueden ser catastróficas. Es por eso que H&I es pionero en nuestro nuevo programa Inside Visiting Sponsorship Service (IVSS, por sus siglas en inglés).

(Debido a la normativa penitenciaria, los voluntarios de reuniones no pueden participar en el centro en el que se ofrecen como voluntarios)

Mínimo cinco años de sobriedad; Sólida experiencia en apadrinamiento; Conocimiento y práctica de los Pasos y Tradiciones de AA; Disposición para enviar mensajes de texto, recibir llamadas telefónicas e intercambiar cartas de forma anónima.

Why Does Your Home-Group Need a GSR?

A General Service Representative (GSR) is a member of your home-group who is selected to represent your meeting's voice on proposed actions affecting the fellowship's unity, health and growth.

- Serves as the relay of vital information between the home-group at the district level and at Area Conferences.
- Informs the home-group on proposed changes and agenda items the General Service Conference may want to make to Alcoholics Anonymous (AA).
- Echoes the group's voice and sentiments on proposed changes to AA literature at the District and Area levels.

AA meeting groups are encouraged to select a group representative who can attend the monthly district meeting, held every third Tuesday, of each month, 5:00 p.m. – 6:30 p.m., Alano Club: 1050 State Street, Redding, CA 96001.
